INJURY claims have cost Buckinghamshire Council more than £200,000 since 2020, new figures show.

The unitary authority paid out for 431 of the 5,207 claims for accidents it received in total during this period.

Compensation in the 2024 calendar year amounted to £18,034.68, while in

2023 they totalled £117,626.41.

The other three years saw similar compensation totals, with £22,670.96 in 2022, £32,003.83 in 2021 and £14,827.93 in 2020.

The council said it logged injury claims according to where incidents took place, such as on roads, along paths or verges or inside premises.

Wanderers send shirt to lifelong fan for his 100th

A lifelong Wycombe Wanderers fan celebrated his 100th birthday with a special surprise from the club

Richard McQueen, a resident at Surrey Heights Dementia Care Centre, was honoured by Wycombe Wanderers with a personalised football shirt, displaying 'McQueen 100', and a special birthday card.

Mr McQueen's love for the club spans several generations, with his father, James Albert McQueen, being a renowned goalkeeper for top European clubs

The McQueen family moved to High Wycombe, further cementing their ties to the Buckinghamshire football scene.

The Wycombe Wanderers Ex-Players Association uncovered more of Mr McQueen's sporting legacy, revealing a rich family history in both football and cricket.

Records show that Mr McQueen's brother, Brian McQueen, played five games for Wycombe reserves during the 1947/48 season and was also a notable cricketer for High Wycombe Cricket Club.

Mr McQueen himself represented Wycombe Wanderers reserves in November 1947.

At 100 years old, he is thought to be the oldest living Wycombe Wanderers player:

Despite his dementia diagnosis, Mr McQueen's passion for Wycombe Wanderers remains strong.

He often asks the care home team to put matches on TV and shares his footballing memories with fellow residents and team members.

Karen Roberts, wellbeing coordinator at Surrey Heights, said: "It's been an absolute pleasure to see Richard's passion for football recognised in such a special way.

"Football has always been at the heart of Richard's life, and this surprise has brought him and his family so much joy."

Sarah, Mr McQueen's daughter, added: "Seeing Dad so engaged, smiling, and chatting with his grandsons and the wonderful team at Surrey Heights was truly heartwarming.

"The care and effort that went into

the day were incredible."

Matt Cecil, head of media at Wy-

combe Wanderers, said: "It was fantastic to hear from the team at Surrey Heights Dementia Care Centre that we had a former player reaching his 100th birthday, and were delighted to be asked to send a personalised shirt and birthday card to mark the occasion.

"So happy birthday Richard on behalf of everyone at Wycombe Wanderers, and thank you to everyone at the care home for making it such a special celebration for him."

Mr McQueen's milestone celebration takes place as Surrey Heights Dementia Care Centre undergoes a £4 million refurbishment.

Chesham United suffer a first league defeat of 2025

HERE were three games to report on this week as Chesham travelled to Chelmsford on Saturday and Farnborough on Tuesday night. Meanwhile Chesham's women welcomed QPR to The Meadow in the FAWNL on Sunday afternoon.

First to Chelmsford where Chesham were held 1-1, securing their third consecutive draw which extends their unbeaten run to seven. Chesham made the stronger start and

came close in the fourth minute courtesy of Mitchell Weiss. Karl Oliyide then had a goal disallowed for a high challenge on the goalkeeper, but Chelmsford took the lead against the run of play on 17 minutes. There was an element of good fortune in the build-up as the ball fell kindly for Kane Crichlow who ran on to shoot into the corner of the net. Chesham continued to dominate without really threatening, but they were awarded a penalty three minutes from half-time. Ted Collins got a hand on the Matt Lench strike to tip it onto the bar and Samson Esan got to the loose ball first but could only head against the bar and the ball was scrambled away.

Chesham continued to press in the early stages of the second half and on 60 minutes Samson Esan ran forward and his shot beat Collins at his near post to level the scores. From there the game could have gone either way as chances fell to both sides. It could have been decided at the death as a stoppage time long throw from Jack Cawley was fumbled by Collins, and Connor Stevens forced the ball over the line but the referee disallowed the goal for a foul.

On Tuesday night, Farnborough inflicted a first league defeat of 2025 on Chesham, edging a narrow 2-1 victory in Hampshire.

Farnborough came into this match without a win in eight games while Chesham were unbeaten in seven, and both runs came to end in an open game. Chesham dominated the early stages

but failed to make their possession count, but Farnborough's opening goal in first-half stoppage time changed the course of the game. In the second half Chesham wilted before a number of substitutions brought about a revival which nearly earned a point but not quite.

Chesham started well and in the twelfth minute Esan set up Weiss who shot past the advancing keeper Jack Turner but just past the far post. That early momentum continued for the first 20 minutes but midway through the half the home side began to threaten for the first time. Neither side found the target but with eight minutes of stoppage time at the end of the half, the home side took the lead in the fifth of them, Jonathon Stuttle cutting in from the left and firing past Addai inside the far post.

Farnborough doubled their lead with a soft goal on 57 minutes. Olly Pendlebury took a free kick from wide on the home left and spotted a gap at the near post, so shot straight into the net as Dillon Addai tried in vain to get across. On 69 minutes, Chesham halved the deficit Joseph cut in from the left and the ball ran loose in the home area before Joe Grant drove it into the net. The visitors tried valiantly to find the equaliser and nearly conceded again as Farnborough were awarded a penalty. However Dillon Addai dived to his right to beat away Aaron Kuhl's shot. Chesham now sit in 12th place in the division with the visit of Weymouth to come this Saturday afternoon.

Wycombe part company with David Wheeler

WYCOMBE Wanderers have confirmed the departure of utility player David Wheeler by mutual consent.

The 34-year-old, who joined the Chairboys from Queens Park Rangers in the summer of 2019, became a fan favourite during his time at Adams Park, playing 209 times and scoring 19 times.

However, game time has been hard to come by this term, as he has featured just 12 times.

His first season in South Buckinghamshire saw him play a huge role in the club's promotion to the Championship, and in his second year, he became the first person to score a winning goal for Wycombe in the division.

This came in Wanderers' 1-0 home victory against Sheffield Wednesday in October 2020.

His final goal for Wycombe came in a 2-0 away victory against Port Vale in April 2024, whilst his farewell appearance was in the 2-0 home win against Portsmouth in the FA Cun last month

the FA Cup last month.

The latter also happened to be Matt Bloomfield's final game in charge before he departed for Luton Town.



Bishop heading to Cambridge

WYCOMBE Wanderers have confirmed the exit of goalkeeper Nathan Bishop.

The 25-year-old, who only played five times for the Chairboys season on loan from Sunderland, has penned a deal with League One rivals Cambridge United.

He joins the Us on loan from the Black Cats until the end of the campaign.

Coincidentally, his last involvement in a Wanderers matchday squad was being an unused substitute in Wycombe's 1-1 draw against the Amber Army on Saturday.

He arrived at Adams Park two years after an initial loan move from Manchester United fell through, initially as the club's number one.

Bishop started the opening day defeat to Wrexham as well as the home loss to Birmingham City three days later, with an appearance against Northampton Town in between.

But a serious leg injury meant he was on the sidelines for four months, allowing Franco Ravizzoli to step in as the club's first choice.

He made his long-awaited return to the starting 11 in the 2-1 home loss to Swindon Town in the EFL Trophy back in December, before coming on as a seventh-minute sub in Wycombe's

2-0 home victory against Portsmouth in the FA Cup.

This was Matt Bloomfield's last game in charge of the Chairboys.

Chief Football Officer Dan Rice said: "Nathan started the season as first-choice in goal but was really unfortunate to sustain his injury.

"He's been the ultimate professional in how he's dealt with the situation and we thank him for all his efforts and contributions.

"We're really pleased that a first-class keeper and person has got the chance to go and play regular football and he leaves us with our very best wishes."

Ex-Wycombe Wanderers winger leaves new club after just two months

A former Wycombe Wanderers winger has left his new club after just two months citing 'personal reasons'.

Connor Parsons, who joined the Chairboys in the summer of 2021 as a free agent following a brief stint with Icelandic side Dalvik/Reynir, agreed to sign for National League club Dagenham & Redbridge in the middle of December.

This was on a free after his contract with Irish outfit Waterford expired, with his transfer back to England being active in January.

His return to the UK was met with great excitement by fans, but after playing in just two games, the 24-year old handed in a transfer request.

According to a statement that was published on the Dags' X account on February 5, Parsons wanted to leave

the club due to 'personal reasons'.

He has since signed for Ireland
Premier Division side Bohemian FC on
a permanent deal for an undisclosed

Speaking on his move back to Ireland, Parsons, who scored 11 goals in 77 matches across two seasons at Waterford, said: "Some things just don't work out, and I think this [move back to Ireland], is the right thing for me.

"This is where I need to be."
Parsons spent two years with
Wycombe between 2021 and 2023,
playing seven first-team games.

He even managed to score on his debut which came in a 3-1 home loss to the Aston Villa U21s in August 2021.


Despite being named as Wanderers' new head coach on February 2, he remained with Sunderland for the away league match to Middlesbrough one day later.

The 33-year-old centre back started the 1-1 draw versus the Amber Army on February 1, but was dismissed on 64 minutes by referee Martin Woods.

He was deemed to have elbowed Michael Morrison in the Wan-derers box whilst defending the corner, and from the resulting incident, Cambridge were awarded

a penalty. However, Josh Stokes' spot kick was saved by Franco Ravizzoli.

At the time of the penalty, Wycombe were 1-0 up thanks to a Cameron Humphreys strike, but Stokes did get United level with a brilliant curling effort with seven minutes left.

If the red card stood, Bradley would have missed Wanderers' next three games against Preston North End, Crawley Town and Bristol Rovers respectively.

A statement from the club reads: "An independent Regulatory Commission has removed Sonny Bradley's three-match suspension following a successful claim of wrongful dismissal."
