Langer to play last European circuit

TWO-TIME Masters champion Bernhard Langer is braced to make a "very emotional" farewell appearance on the DP World Tour at the BMW International Open in Germany today.

Langer will make his 513th and final appearance on the circuit at Golfclub Munchen Eichenried, 50 years after his debut.

The 66-year-old German has won 42 times on the DP World Tour across five decades and continues to enjoy success on the seniors circuit, but has decided to call time on his appearances on his home tour.

"I don't know yet how I will react," the former Ryder Cup player and captain said.

"I've never said goodbye to anything so far in terms of golf, this is going to be a first experience and I have a feeling it's going to be very emotional.

"It means a great deal just to play in front of the home crowd and hopefully I can make the cut.

"I grew up about 45 minutes from here. I worked as an assistant professional 30 minutes from here at Munich Country Club.

"I've played this tournament many times. It's the only one I haven't won yet in Germany, but I'm glad to be back."

Langer, who will play alongside Italian Open winner Marcel Siem and Martin Kaymer in the first two rounds, was set to make his final Masters start in April, but that plan had to be pushed back a year because of an Achilles tendon tear suffered playing pickleball in February.

He said: "It's five months since the operation and things are getting better and better. It's still a bit difficult at times, but golf is not a problem."

Streets of London F1 race plan rebuff

THE HEAD of UK motorsport has said he will not support a Formula One race on the streets of London.

The F1 calendar has continued to expand in recent years, with a round on the Las Vegas strip added last season, while a street race in Madrid is also due to make its debut in 2026.

But speaking ahead of this weekend's British Grand Prix at Silverstone, Motorsport UK chairman David Richards cast significant doubt over whether a race in the capital would ever take off.

"I would not be supportive of a city-centre circuit," he told the PA news agency. "There is no legacy in that for the sport.

"I am not a great fan of the London idea. It is a one-off thing and nobody would get any benefit from it."

F1's American owners Liberty Media previously flirted with the

idea of staging a race in London – but a number of significant roadblocks have thwarted any real progress.

Silverstone's future on the calendar was safeguarded earlier this year, too, after the Northamptonshire track's owners – the British Drivers' Racing Club – agreed a 10-year contract renewal with F1, estimated to be worth around £300million. It is understood that there are no plans to have two UK races on the calendar.

This weekend's British GP – which comes only a week after Englishman George Russell won at the Red Bull Ring in Spielberg following compatriot Lando Norris' collision with Max Verstappen – will be a 150,000 sell-out.

Richards continued: "The new deal is fantastic, and, just as importantly, we have got three British drivers on the grid and we shouldn't forget that. British drivers boost the attendances at Silverstone, and the interest in the championship, so we have to keep nurturing new talent.

"There is nowhere else in this country to host a Formula One race other than Silverstone and we should be making it even better than it already is."

Both Russell and Norris have won this season while seven-time world champion Lewis Hamilton landed his first podium of the season in Spain last month.

Hamilton, 39, will take part in his 18th British Grand Prix on Sunday, and his last for Mercedes before he moves to Ferrari. He has won the event a record eight times, finishing on the podium at the past nine races.

Tributes to a true giant of rugby



STEVE Borthwick has led tributes to former England and Bath head coach Jack Rowell following his death at the age of 87.

Rowell coached England from 1994 to 1997, overseeing 21 victories in 29 Tests, winning Five Nations Grand Slams in 1995 and 1996.

Rowell was appointed by the Rugby Football Union following an outstanding 16-year coaching career with Bath. In a statement, Bath said: "Jack Rowell, all 6ft 7in of him, was a towering figure in the history of Bath and English rugby."

Borthwick said: "We are saddened to hear the passing of Jack Rowell and extend our condolences to his family and friends. His contribution to English rugby was enormous, and he will be sorely missed."

Wildcard for star pairing



ANDY Murray will play mixed doubles at Wimbledon with Emma Raducanu.

The pair have been granted a wildcard, with Murray looking to maximise his opportunities on his final appearance at the All England Club.

Murray famously played mixed doubles with Serena Williams in 2019, with the pair making it to the third round.

It will be a grand slam debut in doubles for Raducanu.

Murray is set to play his first men's doubles match alongside brother Jamie today, with the opening round of the mixed doubles to be held tomorrow and Saturday.

Battle of the Brits at Wimbledon

JACK Draper has built up today's Wimbledon battle of Britain with Cameron Norrie by insisting: "He won't like the fact that I'm number one!"

Draper set up a second-round meeting with Norrie, the man he replaced as the nation's top-ranked male player a fortnight ago, after a five-set win



over qualifier Elias Ymer. The 22-year-old said: "I think we have huge respect for each other, for one. We've practised together so many times and been a part of Davis Cup together."

"I wouldn't say we're extremely close, but we definitely support each other. We definitely

have a great relationship.

"Obviously he won't like the fact that I'm British number one now.

"Dan (Evans) and Cam definitely probably won't like seeing me being British number one. I think that creates a really healthy rivalry and environment.

"We want to win. We want to do the best we can. I think it's going to be a really competitive match today. There won't be any love lost, for sure."

ONE of Wycombe Wanderers' youngest-ever players has been attacked by robbers.

At around 11am on Friday, June 28, two men armed with a Taser and a hammer broke into a property in Benmead Road, Kidlington in Oxfordshire.

One of the inhabitants inside the house happened to be the former Chairboys man,

Ikechi Anya.

The ex-Scottish international, who is of Nigerian and Romanian descent, was confronted by the intruders who also attacked Anya's mother.

The stolen watches were a Chopard Classic Racing Superfast with the Watford FC badge and 'April 2015' engraved on it, a Hublot Classic Fusion Original Black Magic 33mm, and a Rolex Oyster Perpetual 34mm black.

The watches are worth around £20,000 with the perpetrators feeling the scene a black motorcycle that they arrived on, which was not displaying index plates.

Both offenders were wearing motorcycle helmets and dark clothing but one was described as white and the

other as mixed heritage background.

One of them was carrying a dark-coloured rucksack.

Following the incident, the emergency services were called.

Investigating officer Detective Inspector Kate May, of the Priority Crime Team, said: "I understand this may be concerning for the community but there is nothing to suggest there is any wider threat to the public.

"I am appealing for anyone who may have witnessed this aggravated burglary, the motorcyclists in the vicinity or has information about it to please get in touch.

"Also, if you have any CCTV footage or any dashcam footage if you were in the area around the time, I'd also ask that you check any recordings in case it has captured something that could assist our investigation.

"You can make a report by calling 101 or via our website, quoting reference number 43240305029.

"Alternatively, you can report information anonymously to the independent charity, Crimestoppers, by calling 0800 555 111 or via its

website."

Anya initially began his career with Oxford United before joining Wycombe in 2003 following his release from the Us that summer aged 15.

He spent the 2003/04 season in the academy, before making his first team debut for the Chairboys in August 2004, at the age of 16 years, eight months and 25 days,

when he appeared against Aldershot Town in an EFL Trophy fixture.

In all, he would play 25 times for the Adams Park side across three years in the first-team, with 17 of these appearances coming during the 2006/07 campaign.

After his exit that summer, he would go on to have spells at Oxford City, Halesowen

Town, Northampton Town, Sevilla, Celta Vigo, Granada, Cadiz, Watford, and Derby County.

He also appeared 29 times for Scotland, scoring on three occasions.

One of his strikes was against Germany, just two months after they were crowned World Cup champions in 2014.

High Wycombe tennis coach scoops up award

A TENNIS coach from High Wycombe has been crowned Senior Male Player of the Year at the prestigious LTA Tennis Awards, presented by Lexus.

Chris Hearn scooped the gong at the National Tennis Centre in Roehampton before being treated to a day at Wimbledon.

At the World Championships, Hearn partnered Gill Brook to mixed doubles glory in the 60+ category in August last year.

"It is fantastic, I have a lot of good partners which has helped me having enjoyed tennis for so many years," Hearn said.

"And I am still very passionate about it, so it is nice that people recognise you are still keen to play and enjoying it.

"It was great to receive it from Roger Taylor who is a legend and it is nice to see so many friends as well.

"Playing in Portugal was amazing probably not a good idea in my 60s, it was 38, 39 degrees a couple of the days and managed to survive it.

"I had heat stroke and collapsed at a table but with Gill Brook we won the mixed doubles and with the men's singles and doubles I did ok by getting to the semi-finals.

"There were lots of highlights, just playing is a highlight."

The annual LTA Tennis Awards, presented by Lexus, highlight and celebrate the incredible achievements and contributions of people in tennis across Britain.

First launched in 2015 with the help of former LTA president Cathie Sabin OBE, they recognise the vital work of volunteers, coaches, officials, and players dedicating their precious time and energy to the continual de-

velopment and growth of the sport.

Over the past nine years, the awards have illustrated the depth of service and talent within the tennis community and serve as an inspiration to others to get involved in the game.

The winners, selected from more than 2,200 nominations across 16 different categories, have all been acknowledged for their outstanding contribution to tennis in 2023.

As well as winning gold at the World Championships, Hearn also reached the semi-finals in the men's singles and men's doubles, partnering Paul French in the latter.

Hearn plies his trade across Surrey and Berkshire coaching people of all ages as he looks to help people get out of the sport as much as he has.

He added: "I started playing by chance because my grandparents lived by a tennis club, and I used to just go and play with the kids when I visited them at the weekends.

"One day a chap asked me if I wanted to try, and I became addicted.

"Tennis, it has given me an unbelievable life, I am very fortunate, I have travelled the world and for everyone at various levels, it gives you a great time.

"You meet so many nice people and you get to reconnect with people you used to play with when you were younger and it is just fantastic that the governing bodies keep things going for players so there is no end."

A sour taste after fan favourite leaves?

SHREWSBURY Town have been criticised by some of their own fans following the club's statement on Daniel Udoh's exit to Wycombe Wanderers.

The Nigerian forward, 27, departed the Salopians after five years in Shropshire to pen a deal with the Chairboys.

In doing so, he has become the club's eighth new signing of the summer.

However, despite scoring 38 times in 181 appearances, which includes hitting double figures in both the 2021/22 and 2023/24 season, some Shrewsbury supporters have slammed the club's departure letter, with one fan labelling it as 'disgusting'.

The club's statement reads: "Shrewsbury Town are disappointed to confirm Dan Udoh has turned down the offer of a new contract and has left the club to join Wycombe.

"Signed from AFC Telford United in May 2019, the striker made 181 appearances in blue and amber, scoring 38 goals.

"Dan's contract with Town expired this summer.

"Negotiations with the forward began last August with the club going on to meet his demands in terms of wages and a three-year contract.

"But Dan has opted to leave after being offered more money elsewhere.

"Shrewsbury Town would like to thank Dan for all his service over the past five years."

Several fans did not like the word the statement was worded, with this fan saying: "This is an absolutely disgusting statement and a spit in the face of one of the best players to play for this club in the past decade."

Another said: "Offered him pennies when they offered pounds. Sour taste this statement and can't blame him for leaving."

This fan said: That statement is awful.

"Dan Udoh has been a brilliant servant.

"It is disappointing he is leaving, especially to a division rival - nonetheless, bad taste.

"I wish Dan all the best and hope he has 44 great league games next season."

In an open letter to the Shrewsbury supporters, the club's director of football Micky Moore said: "I - and all the staff at the club - would like to wish him the best of luck for the future.

"Dan had a real connection with our supporters. That connection was partly due to his performances and the goals he scored on the pitch.

"But it was also because of the way he conducted himself in and around the club.

"Dan is someone who always has a smile on his face and I know he was great with our fans and in the community.

"It was a real shame to see him move on.

"Contract negotiations began back in August.

"We offered him both the wages and the length of contract he wanted.

"But he has decided to move on and I wish both him and his family nothing but the best."

Udoh leaves Shrewsbury to join Wycombe

WYCOMBE Wanderers have confirmed the signing of former Shrewsbury Town striker Daniel Udoh on a free transfer.

The 27-year-old, who has represented his native Nigeria at youth level, arrives at Adams Park after five years with the Salops, where he scored 38 times in 181 matches.

He becomes the club's eighth signing this summer, following the acquisitions of Alex Hartridge, Jaiden Bartolo, Jack Matton, Nathan Bishop, Brody Peart, Tyreeq Bakinson and Daniel Harvie respectively.

Manager Matt Bloomfield told the club's media outlets: "Dan has got a great eye for goal and works extremely hard for the team, so we're thrilled that he's agreed to begin a new chapter in his career by moving to Wycombe and

strengthening our attacking options.

"He's been a handful for our defence whenever we've come up against him down the years and we've been tracking his progress for some time.

"Adding someone of his calibre to our frontline is another great step forward for us in this transfer window and I think the fans will take him to their hearts quickly."

Udoh, who has also played for 14 different teams prior to his move to Buckinghamshire, said: "I want to push on have a new challenge.

"The plans and the ambition of where Wycombe are at right now match where I want to go to as I'm 27, turning 28.

"I need to push on in my career."

His move remains subject to EFL and FA approval.

WYCOMBE Wanderers have confirmed the signing of former Milton Keynes wing-back, Daniel Harvie.

The 25-year-old left-sided defender joins the Chairboys after four years in the north of the county, where he played 166 times and scored 10 times.

He even bagged a strike against his new employers when the two Buckinghamshire outfits met in April 2023 at Adams Park, which finished 2-2.

Upon his arrival at Bucks' first EFL side, manager Matt Bloomfield told the club's website: "Dan's an excellent

addition to our squad and we're thrilled that he's decided to make the move to Wycombe and be part of what we're building here.

"He was one of the best left-backs and wing-backs in League One for a couple of years and has also shown he can play wide of a back three.

"The data tells us that playing as a full-back will complement his strengths as well, so having someone who can play in a few positions will give us another dimension on the left side.

"The squad is taking shape nicely

ahead of the season, which is a testament to the hard work of everybody behind the scenes.

"We're excited to combine these new faces with the quality we've already got in the squad and make sure we're as strong as we can be when the season kicks off next month."

The Glaswegian began his career at Aberdeen, spending nine years at Pittodrie, but only played seven times for the first team across three seasons.

A successful loan move to Dumbarton followed in the 2016/17

campaign followed, before he permanently left the Dandies in 2018.

He would go into have two years at Ayr United, playing 77 times and scoring once.

His positive performances caught the eye of those at Milton Keynes who signed Harvie in 2020 for an undisclosed fee.

His final appearance for MK was in the club's 5-1 home drubbing against Crawley Town in the League Two play-off semi-final second leg in May.

His move to Adams Park is subject to approval from the FA and the EFL.

Chairboys reveal Tyreeq is a Wanderer

WYCOMBE Wanderers have confirmed the signing of former Sheffield Wednesday midfielder Tyreeq Bakinson on a free transfer.

The 25-year-old arrives at Adams Park following his exit from the Owls after two years in Yorkshire.

He also spent the latter half of the previous season on loan at Charlton Athletic, scoring once in 15 games.

Coincidentally, his last game for the Addicks happened to be at Wycombe on the final day of the 2023/24 campaign.

Bakinson has become the club's sixth signing of the summer, following the arrivals of Nathan Bishop from Sunderland (on loan) Jaoden Bartolo from Wealdstone, Alex Hatridge from Exeter City, Jack Matton from Woking and Brody Peart from Brighton and Hove Albion respectively.

The latter was announced minutes before a Chairboys XI took on Aylesbury United on June 28, which finished 3-3.

Wycombe, at one stage, were 3-0 down.

Speaking on the signing of Bakinson, manager Matt Bloomfield told the club's website: "We've been big admirers of Tyreeq for a long time and we're delighted that he's chosen to come here, having had interest from elsewhere as well.

"He's a player with a lot of ability on the ball but his size and presence in the middle of the park will really complement the talents we've already got in that area.

"Tyreeq will suit the way we want to play and he fits the profile of the type of player we want to have in the squad, so we're excited to see what he can do for us and I think the fans will love seeing him out there on the pitch."

The central midfielder began his career at Luton Town but played

just six first-team matches across three seasons between 2015 and 2017.

A move to Bristol City followed, but he spent his first two years on loan at various EFL sides in the West Country.

During the 2017/18 year, he played 42 times and scored one goal for Notts County in League Two.

He remained in the fourth tier for the following season [2018/19], but this time at Plymouth Argyle, where he scored twice in 14 matches.

Bakinson did not play a single minute of football during the 2019/20 season, before becoming a first-team regular for Bristol City a year later.

In all, he featured 39 times and bagged four strikes during the 2020/21 campaign, which includes scoring a stunning goal against Wycombe.

This was in April 2021 as Wanderers defeated City 2-1 at Adams Park.

The goal was regarded as one of the best in the Championship that season, but the fixture is best remembered for Wycombe legend Adebayo Akinfenwa scoring his first and only second-tier goal.

This occurred in the final minute of injury-time to give the Chairboys the three points.

A loan move to Ipswich Town followed a year later where he scored two goals in 17 matches, before a permanent switch to Sheffield Wednesday took place in the summer of 2022.

It's fair to say that the midfielder struggled in Yorkshire, playing just 42 times in 18-months, as he spent the final stint of his Owls contract at Charlton last season.

His move to Adams Park is subject to EFL and FA approval.
