The Rams had a strong start to the game, with Jo Lawal com-ing close on two occasions, once after a great link-up play from Noguera Leon and Dembele, and another time, only being stopped by a good save from Bowler.

However, the game quickly turned, with two well-taken goals by Roger James giving the visitors a two-goal lead at halftime. After the break, the Rams came out with determination, quickly scoring a goal back. NON-LEAGUE Holmer Green 3G approved for start

HOLMER Green have seen final permission for a new 3G pitch approved, with work set to begin in September.
Grant funding of just over £1m

has allowed work to commence from September, ready in time for January 2025.

Releasing a statement on their social media channels, Co-Chair of the Holmer Green Sports Association, Rob Shed, said: "I'm very pleased to announce that just over four years after we started the process, we have received approval for an Artificial Grass Pitch (3G) to be built at Holmer Green.

"It will be fully funded by a combination of the Football Foundation, the Premier League Stadium Fund and a combination of a number of funds that were secured.

"This includes the funds contributed by the Football Club and its members.

Total grant funding is just over £1m, a significant investment that we expect to provide lasting benefits to the health and wellbeing of the community and provide opportunities for girls, boys, men, women, able-bodied and disabled to enjoy football on our

fantastic all-weather surface.
"The final planning permission was secured back in June and the new 25-year extended lease for the grounds was also signed with Buckinghamshire Council back

in June.

"We have today issued a letter of intent to the contractor, SIS Pitches, that they have accepted which means a start on site of September 16 with completion by December 13.

This means that the new pitch

will be operational by January 2025. "There will inevitably be some

disruption to our training and matches whilst construction is in progress and we have been working on a plan to make this as trouble free as we can.

"It will all be worthwhile in the end.'

The ground has also had several positive reviews on Google, with the football stadium earning an average score 4.2/5 from 103 testimonials.

One review said: "The ground has two covered stands, the main one being seated, and the smaller one behind the right hand side of the goal standing only.

"Parking is plentiful and located between the clubhouse and pitch. "The facilities are very good, in-

cluding a well stocked bar. "Half-time food and drinks are available from the clubhouse, which is reasonably priced and

good quality.
"The club offers a friendly and welcoming atmosphere, and on the day of my visit, a very enter-taining match, seeing the Greens comfortably take the win.

Holmer Green exit FA Vase after Rothwell comeback

IHIS weekend saw the start of this season's FA Vase, a competition in which 596 teams from the fifth & sixth tier of non-league football are competing for the right to play in a Wembley final next May, writes Stephen Powell.

Standing in Holmer's way of progressing to the next round were Northamptonshire side Rothwell Corinthians who currently occupy 10th place in the first division of the Spartan South Midlands League.

With neither side having a great record in the competition and sit-ting in mid table of their comparative leagues, this will have been viewed by both as an excellent op portunity to advance to the second qualifying round, and an away trip to Broadfields United.

Having been rested on Tuesday, Ruairidh Barnes retuned to partner Liam Butters in the centre of defence, with Jake Braim and Tyler Sims also earning a place in the starting line-up. Jacob Hearne made his first start of the season, coming in for Oskar Esplund Evans at full back, but there was no Alex Colverd who'd picked up an injury in training on Thursday.

After conceding a goal in the first five minutes of their last two games, it was important that the Greens got off to a good start, and they certainly did that.

From a seventh-minute corner a Butters header was parried by the keeper and Jeffrey Fordjour was the first to react and bundled the ball over the line to give his side an early lead. Just four minutes later the lead was doubled when Sims made a good run down the left and picked

out Lloyd Majaya at the back post who finished well.

Within a minute of the restart, Rothwell, who hadn't been in the game until that point, were gifted a goal. With two covering defenders, Jensen Ellis came out of his goal to try and intercept a through ball by the touchline. The Rothwell forward, James Sutton beat him to the ball and despite the tight angle, managed to score from 30 vards.

Getting a goal back gave the away side the lift they needed, and they had the better of the next 20 minutes, with Holmer surviving several corners and Ellis keeping them ahead with a good tip over the bar. Having survived the pressure it was disappointing that when the equaliser came, it was again due to a mistake. In the 37th minute Barnes lost the ball on the halfway line and Rothwell broke quickly down the right. A cross to the far post was met by Vincenzo Falcini who was able to find the back of the net despite not making the cleanest of contacts.

Early in the second half, Majaya came close to restoring the lead, but his shot was cleared off the line with the keeper beaten. Despite Holmer looking the more threat-ening, Rothwell did go close on the hour with a header from a corner going just wide. Shortly after, Fordjour should have had his second of the game, but his shot found the

side netting. The last 20 minutes saw Holmer create several excellent chances with Sims hitting the crossbar, Esplund Evans forcing a great save from the keeper and Fordjour again going close. The best of the chances though fell to Sims, who fired over from 12 yards with the keeper down following a challenge with Majaya.

As the game went into injury time and penalties looming, Barnes tried to play the ball out from the back and was dispossessed by Sutton. The Rothwell forward made no mistake, firing past Ellis and sending his team into the next round.

After taking a two-goal lead this was a very disappointing result especially given that all three goals conceded were due to individual errors. The clubs poor record in the FA Vase continues but the squad managed put this defeat behind them quickly as on Tuesday, local rivals Penn & Tylers Green were defeated 2-0.

Jeffery Fordjour netted a brace at French School Meadows to return to winning ways.

A day to remember at Aintree

STEWKLEY-BASED former racehorse, Gentleman At Arms, was crowned The Tattersalls RoR Ridden Showing Supreme Champion at the prestigious Jockey Club RoR National Championships at Aintree on Saturday, alongside owner and rider, Harriet Edmunds.

Completing a unique Aintree double having won the Class 2 Pertemps Hurdle Series Qualifier in November, the seven-year-old retired from the sport in February, and is now enjoying great success in showing, demonstrating the extraordinary versatility of thoroughbreds.

The Jockey Club RoR National Championships is Great Britain's largest event exclusively for former racehorses, with six days of competition across various levels, including classes in dressage, arena eventing, showjumping, and showing.

A total of 294 former racehorses competed at Aintree International Equestrian Centre.

In a racing career that spanned four years, Gentleman At Arms, whose stable name is Arthur, won six races and accumulated over £90,000 in earnings under the guidance of Harriet's father, Stuart Edmunds, at his Stewkley yard, where Harriet is Assistant Trainer.

Despite falling out of love for racing following kissing spine surgery last year, Arthur's talents are showing no limits, with the National Championships success coming exactly six months after his last race.

Harriet Edmunds said: "It's completely surreal, I'm just enjoying the whole experience.

"I always dreamt of having him [when he retired], but never thought the day would come.

"Neither of us had ever been showing before May, so to be coming away from our first National Championships as the Supreme Champion is a dream come true."

Rupert Arnold, Executive Consultant for RoR said: "This was a very special event with an amazing atmosphere. To see so many former racehorses in one place looking so well and competing in such a diverse array of disciplines not only showcases what these horses are capable of outside of their racing careers, but also the love and dedication of their owners."

"On behalf of the charity and the competitors, we would like to say a huge thank you to all our supporters including The Jockey Club for their generous headline sponsorship, Tattersalls for supporting our showing series and all the individual class and other supporters."

Chairboys to host Champions League club at Adams Park

WYCOMBE Wanderers will host Aston Villa in the third round of the League Cup.

The Chairboys will take on the Champions League side after they brilliantly defeated Swan-sea City of the Championship 1-0 in the second round at the Swansea University Stadium.

It will be the first meeting between the two teams since the 2015/16 FA Cup when Wanderers took Villa to a replay, following a 1-1 draw at Adams Park, only to lose 2-0 to Villa in the Midlands 10 days later.

The fixture will also be the first time since the 2005/06 season that the Chairboys will meet the Villains in this competition.

The previous encounter back in September 2005, saw the Premier League club defeat Wycombe 8-3 at Adams Park, despite being 3-1 down at half-

Prior to that, the first-ever match between the two was also in this competition two years prior in September 2003.

That too was also played at Adams Park, which saw Wycombe lose 5-0 with former England in-ternational Darius Vassell and the late Peter Whittingham getting on the scoresheet between a Juan Pablo Angel hat-trick.

The match will take place the week commencing September

Speaking after the win in South Wales on August 28, Bloomfield said: ""We played some really good stuff in the first half and we knew we were going to have large spells without the ball. We worked hard on our shape and

structure," said Bloomfield.
"We had to enjoy it when we had the ball playing against a possession-based team.
"We created some good chanc-

es in the first half.

"We had nine or 10 players out and we had to rotate the team. I'm immensely proud of the way the boys defended.

"We knew we'd need to be so well drilled in and out of possession and we executed it superbly. We had a lot of players missing through injury but the lads performed excellently."

However, it was a night to forget for Swansea manager Luke Williams, whose side were booed off following a very flat display at the Swansea University Stadium.

The 2013 winners of the competition were unable to register a single shot on goal from their seven attempts, whilst the Chairboys had five shots on goal, with two of them being on

Speaking after the loss, just days after a 1-1 draw against rivals Cardiff City, Williams said: "The first half was atrocious.

"We improved after that, but it's still not a good performance," said Williams.
"There was a lack of energy,

lack of intensity, lack of aggression, and lack of quality in a disjointed performance.

"They've certainly been told they can't come out with that type of lethargic attitude."

It was Wycombe's first win in Wales against a Welsh side since November 2016 - a span that lasted nearly 3,000 days.

Wanderers have lost the last two **League Cup** matches against **Aston Villa with a** staggering aggregate score of 13-3.

A Cameron Humphreys strike on his debut gave Wycombe Wanderers their first league victory of the season, as they defeated Rotherham United 2-0 at Adams Park.

The first meaningful attempt of the contest fell to Joe Powell on eight minutes, but his free-kick 25-yards out was easily gathered stand-in keeper, Franco Ravizolli.

Sam Nombe smashed over from range moments later, whilst the Argentine shotstopper was on hand to deny Hakeem Odoffin and Mallik Wilks.

For the Chairboys, Richard Kone forced Dillon Phillips into a comfortable stop, before the ex-Charlton man was on hand to thwart an effort from Matt Butcher. The second-half was a lot more livelier as

both teams went for it.

Ravizzoli again denied Nombe, Odoffin and Wilks, with the latter's strike being tipped onto the post.

Debutant Aaron Morley went close for Wycombe, while Dan Udoh's header missed the target by inches.

But there was a breakthrough in the 70th minute and it was for Wanderers.

A long ball played over by Kieran Sadlier

found Humphreys who did brilliantly to turn the Millers' defence inside out, before unleashing an unstoppable drive beyond

Kieran Sadlier then wrapped up the win with a penalty with five minutes remain-

The strikes against the Millers were the club's first since March 2013, ending a run that lasted over 4.000 days.

In addition to the victory, the result means Rotherham's long wait for an away league continues.

Their last win on the road came on November 8, 2022 - 656 days ago.

Up next for the Chairboys in the league is an away lunch-time clash at Blackpool on

King Richard's goal eliminates Swansea

WYCOMBE Wanderers have secured a place in the third round of the League Cup for the first time in three seasons following a hard-fought 1-0 win

over Swansea City.
In one of the shocks of the round, Richard Kone's welltaken strike just before the break sealed the Chairboys' first win in Wales since 2016, and most importantly, their second consecutive victory of the new season.

In an open first-half, the opening chance of the contest fell to Josh Scowen, but his bending effort on the edge of the box was easily gathered by Lawrence Vigouroux.

Franco Ravizzoli was rarely tested during the opening 45 minutes, despite Swansea getting into some very good posi-

Zan Vipotnik got on the end of a Nelson Abbey cross, but the former couldn't connect as cleanly as he would have liked, as his header missed the target.

Kyle Naughton, who is now in his 11th season with the South Wales team, tried his luck from range but his effort was blocked by Tyreeq Bakinson, whilst Matt Grimes and Florian Bianchini also had a halfchances.

Kieran Sadlier then went close for Wycombe, as his snap shot just wide of the target, before Wycombe scored five minutes before the break.

Richard Kone bagged his second strike of the season after a brilliant move with Matt

got near the six-yard box, he laid it off back to Kone, who took one touch and buried it past the ex-Oxford man Vigouroux, who was helpless.

The second half was a flatter affair but Wanderers defended imperiously to keep their slender lead intact.

The Swans had a whopping 73 per cent of the ball at the Swansea University Stadium, but failed to register a single shot on target as Wycombe held on.

The result means the Chairboys have entered the third round of the League Cup for the first time since the 2021/22 season, when they lost 6-1 to Manchester City at the Etihad Stadium.

It is also their first win in Wales in nearly 3,000 days.

Their last triumph west of the border came in November 2016, when Sido Jombati's late freekick gave Gareth Ainsworth's 1-0 victory over Newport County

Coincidentally, Wycombe's last win over Swansea came in the same round of this competition in August 2006.

That year, the Chairboys reached the semi-finals, losing

to Chelsea 5-1 on aggregate in the final four.

The Blues would go on to win that year's cup, beating London rivals Arsenal 2-1 in the final at the Millennium Stadium in Cardiff

They will now play Aston Villa in the third round at Adams Park next month.

Evans on Wanderers loss at **Adams Park**

ROTHERHAM United manager Steve Evans said his side 'dominated' despite falling to a 2-0 loss over Wycombe Wanderers.

Goals from Cameron Humphreys and a Kieran Sadlier penalty se-cured the Chairboys' first league win of the campaign, and suc-cumbed the Millers to a third consecutive game without a goal.

The result also means United have now not won on the road in the league for 656 days - a run that dates back to November 8, 2022.

For Wanderers it was their first victory against Rotherham in any capacity since April 2021, and their first at Adams Park since January 2011.

He said: "We had good opportuni-ties in the final third so from that point of view it's very disappoint-

ing. 'We dominated in long, long spells and I'll be absolutely gobsmacked if the supporters who were here today didn't think we played well and absolutely gobsmacked if they don't go away wondering how we didn't win that

game three- or four-nil.

"We should have been three ahead at half-time but we didn't take our chances. The boys at the back were never stretched until we go a goal down.

"We'll go away and look at the positives, there aren't a lot of negatives, the negatives are at the front end of the pitch. We need to score a goal but I think we'll play a

lot worse and win.'
"I thought there were spells today that we played as well as we could against Wycombe for long

spells.
"It's the quietest I have heard the supporters here until they scored, and that's because of our dominance.
