# Improving for the home fans



The Hour Glass is the closest pub to Adams Park with it being a

THE closest pub to Wycombe Wanderers' Adams Park stadium has insisted that their 'rough reputation' is a thing of the past and that the bar will allow both home and away fans next season.

The Hour Glass, which is a 15-minute walk away from the Hillbottom Road venue, had gathered a status associated with violence and disorder in previous years.

And with the establishment mainly

being used by visiting spectators getting behind the Chairboys' op-ponents, the hostility amongst fans grew to the point that anyone wearing Wycombe's colours were not allowed in on matchdays to avoid con-

However, the pub's new landlord, Luke Gregory, has stated that he aims to have both sets of supporters in the establishment come August, and that the bar will be decorated in light and dark blue.

He told the Free Press: "It's not rough anymore.
"We've had a lot of different char-

acters in the past that may have given the pub that 'rough' reputation, but it's not like that and we don't have many issues

"I've had the pub for about 11 months now and it has always been mainly used for the away fans, but we want to make this for home fans too. 'That's the aim.

"Of course, we won't want to turn away any away fans, but, we're in the process of trying to get a few Wanderers items up on the wall such as photos, scarves, framed shirts etc.

"We want to have flags, history pieces, and pictures up and around the place to make it Wycombe-friend-

"We've redecorated the back garden and the interior, and we're trying to get as many Wanderers bits up and around the pub.

"I don't want to say we're specifi-cally for Wycombe fans only, but it'll be the Wycombe home pub with the away fans being welcome.

The landlord also spoke about the importance of visiting pubs within the local community, after official government figures stated that more than 150 across England and Wales have shut in 2023.

This number has since risen and

will continue to increase.

He continued: "The pub does alright on its own, but when the football is on, it really does help us out a lot, as that extra income can actually help us do things.

"So many pubs have shut in the town, and you can tell which ones and struggling, and which ones are

"The town centre or high street has not been the same since Covid, and I don't think it will be the same for a long time, if ever.

"Pubs that are staying around are paying their bills and are still doing what they need to do, but it won't be the same as it was.

The pub is looking for anyone who would like to donate any surplus Wycombe Wanderers items to put up on their wall as décor.

A MEMBER from High Wycombe Judo Centre will represent Team GB at two separate tournaments this summer.

Jesse Chraniuk will take part

in this year's Cadet European Championships in Odivelas, Portugal from between June 22

He will also show off his skills at the European Youth Olympic Festival in Maribor, Slovenia between July 23 and 29.

After being ranked 62nd best in the world in December, Jesse is now number one in the British Cadet rankings and 14th in the World Cadet

rankings. This comes after he won two bronze medals at a tournament in Italy earlier this year. British Judo Head of

### Ex-GK Anderson on new office job

A FORMER Wycombe Wanderers goalkeeper has forged a new career in finance just 18 months after departing the Chairboys.

Curtis Anderson, who spent a season-and-a-half with the club without making a first-team appearance, admitted that he 'sometimes struggled with football life', and that his new office role has given him 'stability.'

This new venture comes just six years after the 22-year-old had been England's first-choice keeper at the FIFA Under 17 World Cup in India, which the Three Lions won.

Speaking on his new job, Anderson, who also plays for Non League Bootle on a part time basis, told the Times: "My interest in finance came from being at City, signing a pro [contract] and then two years later having no money left.

"When I look back, I wonder what I spent my money on.

"I got an apartment, a car, and bought a Rolex thinking that's the worst thing I could have bought and it's been the best thing I bought.

it's been the best thing I bought. "That's the only thing I could sell now for more than I bought it for."

His life now involves working at Markland Hill Wealth in Liverpool, crunching numbers and helping people with their monetary issues.

But despite having a stable life that doesn't involve numerous travelling, Anderson admitted there was a sense of what could have been when watching last year's FIFA World Cup in Qatar. He explained: "I really struggled

He explained: "I really struggled [watching the World Cup] because I was seeing so many of my old teammates and people I had spent a lot of time with.

"Then there's me, sat at home watching it on TV, thinking, 'how has this ended up happening?'

"I have struggled sometimes with my football life.

"You could look at it and say it's quite sad, up and down, it's not great.
"But at the same time, whether

"But at the same time, whether you put it down to luck or not, I grew up with Phil Foden, who's won the Premier League five times he's the same age as me."

"Whether it's unlucky, unfortunate, wrong decisions here or there, people not helping, whatever you want to call it, it's not great.

"I sometimes struggle with how I feel about it."

# The place for away fans to visit in HW

A High Wycombe pub is hoping to become an official away day boozer for when the new League One season starts in August.

The Flint Cottage, which is situated directly opposite Wycombe Train Station, is encouraging travelling football fans to come to the Amersham Hill establishments when their respective side take on Wycombe Wanderers.

Clive Grace, who has been the pub's holding general manager since March, revealed exclusively to the Free Press that due to the public house's prime location where travelling spectators will be present, now is the right time to 'promote the pub' as much as possible.

This comes after several bars have shut all across Buckinghamshire due to the cost of food produce and the lack of customers.

Official government figures have revealed that more than 150 pubs in England and Wales shut down in the first three months of this year.

Clive told the Free Press: "I thought about this coming up to the end of last season.

"The previous manager didn't really push it but now that I'm in charge, I really want to push this.

"I recently joined the League One Facebook page, expressed my plan and I've had a lot of good feedback from fans all over the division.

"When the football season is up and running, pubs are the heart and soul of any team, especially like us who are close to the train

station where there will be many fans.

"It will be a great way to get involved in the football.
"I thought it would be a nice way

"I thought it would be a nice way to promote the pub for when the away fans come to the town."

Clive also explained that even though he aims to have the pub primarily for away supporters, the bar will still be useable for any fan regardless of allegiance and that he could even open up the establishment as early as 9am.

And with several teams in the division next season being relatively close to Wycombe geographically, such as Reading, Oxford, Leyton Orient, Northampton Town and Stevenage, he hopes his project can take off.

project can take off.

He continued: "I know that Wycombe is a football town but some pubs here don't let people in that wear a football shirt, where I have no problem with that.

"It's all about being safe and having a good environment, and we are an LGBTQ+ friendly pub, and we won't tolerate any rude behaviour or comments from punters.

"With the local teams, Wycombe's main rival [now that MK went down], is Oxford, and last season, even though I wasn't here for the game, I remember being told it was very busy."

The first batch of away fans to visit Adams Park next season will be Cardiff City for Joe Jacobson's testimonial on July 29.

# JJ's testimonial is confirmed

WYCOMBE Wanderers will play Cardiff City in Joe Jacobson's testimonial match this summer.

The 36-year-old will be celebrated at Adams Park during the fixture on July 29, as he enters his 10th year at the club, after he penned a new one-year

deal earlier this year.
This was down to triggering an appearance clause in his previous contract.

"I'm a Cardiff boy, born and bred, and it was a source of huge pride for me and my family to play for the club right at the start of my career.

"I've loved every minute of my time at Wycombe so far and to bring my two favourite clubs together for this game will be an incredible occasion that I'll always cherish.

"I'd like to thank the board and everyone at Wycombe Wanderers for granting me this testimonial game, and Cardiff City for agreeing to provide the opposition.

Jacobson began his career with his boyhood club, playing twice across the 2005/06 and 2006/07 seasons, before having loan spells at Accrington Stanley and Bristol Rovers respec-

After winning promotion into League One with the latter in May 2007 in the League Two play-off final, he signed for the Pirates permanently, before departing for Oldham Athletic in

He would play just 16 times across two seasons, before moving back to Accrington on loan for the rest of the 2010/11 campaign.

Three successful years followed at Shrewsbury Town where he once again won promotion in 2012 from the fourth tier into the third, but after being released in 2014, he would move south to Adams Park.

Jacobson has since gone to feature 377 times for the Chairboys and has been part of three playoff campaigns (2015, 2020 and 2022), has won promotion twice (2018 and 2020), and scored the winning goal that secured Wanderers' place in the Championship for the first time in their history.

Chairman Rob Couhig added: "Joe has been an outstanding professional for Wycombe Wanderers, not just on the pitch with his undoubted talent and countless significant contributions, but also off the pitch as our captain, a leader, a general and someone who our supporters and the whole town rightly

holds in the highest regard.
"When we knew he would be with us for his tenth season, we had no hesitation in granting him a testimonial game.

Wycombe last played Cardiff at Adams Park in December 2020, where they defeated the Bluebirds 2-1 thanks to Ryan Tafazolli's first goal for the club, along with a David Wheeler header.

The match was played behind closed doors due to the Covid-19 pandemic.

WYCOMBE Wanderers' new home kit for the 2023/24 season has been released, and it's been met with critical acclaim.

The strip is the first to be produced by the Danish sports manufacturers, Hummel, with Origin Doors and Windows being the shirt's main sponsor.

They replace the outgoing O'Neill's, who had designed the Chairboys' kits for the past seven years, and Dreams, who had been the face of Wanderers' shirts since 2020.

The club said: "The shirt has all the hallmarks of a classic Hummel kit, with beautiful detail and the iconic Hummel chevrons.

"It's made from 100 per cent polyester, with micro mesh shoulder panels, 1×1 rib collar and neckline with contrast tipping, official authentication badge, woven chest badge and Hummel printed back neck tape
