MP 'delighted' at further funding to help support households

GREG Smith MP has welcomed the news that the Conservative Government have announced the new Household Support Fund Allocations for Local Authorities across England.

The 29-year-old right-back suffered a head injury in the Chairboys' 1-0 victory over Bolton Wanderers on February 18, and was replaced by Jordan Willis after just 33 minutes.

This led to first-half stoppage time adding up to nine minutes, which is when Lewis Wing scored the only goal of the match to secure Wy-

combe's fifth league win in a row. It's also the first time that Wanderers have secured five consecutive victories in the third tier of English football.



JOHN Motson, one of the most iconic and influential commentators of the 20th century, has passed away at the age of 77.

is remembered

The broadcaster, who was the voice of more than 2,000 games during his career, died in the early hours of Thursday, February 23.

One of his most notable re-ports was in 1990 at Adams Park, the home of Wycombe Wanderers.

Dressed in his famous sheepskin coat, Motson spoke at the Hillbottom Road venue in the middle of a snowstorm.

The Chairboys were due to take on Peterborough United in a FA Cup tie, but the game was postponed after gale force winds and heavy snow, forced

the match to be postponed. Standing in the centre of Adams Park, battling the cold conditions, Motson said in his report: "I'm afraid to say that Mark West and Martin O'Neill will have to wait a few days longer if they are going to add another chapter to Wycombe's famous cup history.

"As you can see, this part of Buckinghamshire is snowbound and there's a bit of gale blowing as well.

Motson, popularly known as 'Motty' by a generation of football fans, enjoyed a 50-year ca-reer with the BBC during which he covered 10 World Cups, 10 European Championships and 29 FA Cup Finals.

After starting as a newspaper

reporter in Barnet and at the Sheffield Morning Telegraph, Motson joined the BBC in 1968 as a sports presenter on Radio

Motson's commentary Ronnie Radford's famous long-range strike which helped non-league Hereford knock topflight Newcastle out of the FA Cup in 1972 saw him take top billing on Match of the Day pushing him into the spotlight and the affections of the sporting public.

His long career also took in two Olympic Games and Wim-bledon's memorable 1988 FA Cup final triumph against Liverpool at Wembley as the Crazy Gang beat the Culture Club.

In 2001, Motson received an OBE for services to sports broadcasting.

Over the course of his career, he commentated on almost 2,500 games for BBC television, working on Match of the Day from 1971 until he retired in 2018

Sky Sports News presenter Jim White added: "Sad news, legendary football commentator John Motson has died.

He was 77." Numerous other broadcasters and clubs have paid tribute to Motson, which includes Wy-combe Wanderers, who shared the image of him standing at a snow covered Adams Park 32-and-a-bit years ago.

IT was the news that no one wanted to hear, but the blow of losing Gareth Ainsworth to Queens Park Rangers was softened by the appointment of fans' favourite Matt Bloomfield to replace him as Wycombe manager.

Bloomfield inherits a Wanderers team in fabulous form after three wins in a week - two against leading promotion contenders - and they look a good bet to reach the playoffs for the third time in four seasons.

Wanderers have taken maximum points from nine of their last 12 games, and their rivals for a place in the top six arguably have tougher fixtures in the run-in to the end of the season.

Only two of Wycombe's remaining 15 games are against sides currently above them in the table - Barnslev (H) and Ipswich Town (A) - and after recent results they need fear no team in the division.

Next up is a trip to Shrewsbury Town on Saturday, February 25, with the hosts having seen their sevengame unbeaten run come to an end last week against Accrington Stanley, who had lost to the Chairboys a few days earlier.

The two clubs are old rivals and have met no fewer than thirty times since first facing each other in the 1993/94 season, Wycombe's inaugural campaign in the Football League.

In the most recent fixture, Wanderers lost 2-1 at Adams Park in August last year despite going in front through a Garath McCleary goal.

Matthew Pennington equalised, and the Shrews snatched a last-minute winner with a penalty converted by Luke Leahy

On their last visit to Shropshire in September 2021, Wanderers won 2-1 thanks to goals by Joe Jacobson and Ryan Tafazolli with Pennington again on target for the home side.

Historically, the Chairboys have held the upper hand against Saturday's opponents with twelve wins and only five defeats, but most games (14) have ended in a draw.

Before their surprise defeat at Accrington. Shrewsbury had not lost a league game since New Year's Day, a run that included six wins in-a-row. At home they have beaten promotion contenders Bolton Wanderers and drawn with Derby County.

Another tough game awaits Gareth Ainsworth's men, but confidence is high and victory would increase the gap on the teams below them in the table before consecutive home games against Exeter City and Fleetwood.

The 39-year-old replaces the departing Gareth Ainsworth, who has joined Queens Park Rangers as their new head coach, following the sacking of Neil Critchley on February 19

Bloomfield, who played over 500 times for the Chairboys between 2004 and 2021, retired from profes-sional football in 2022 on medical grounds but was added to Ainsworth's backroom staff for the latter half of the 2021/22 season.

He continued as coach until being appointed as Colchester United's new boss in September last year, where he won nine matches in 28 fixtures, which included picking up 13 points from six games in January This landed him that month's

Manager of the Month award. Speaking on his return to Adams Park, he said: "I'm delighted to be back and looking forward to getting stuck into the task at hand

"It's a really exciting time for the football club and an exciting prospect for myself. I'm ready for this job.

"I'm so grateful to Colchester for the opportunity they gave me and the faith they showed in me. "I loved my time there but the lure

of coming back here to manage this football club was always going to be too big to turn down."

Goalkeeper coach Lee Harrison, who also joined Bloomfield at Col-chester in September, has also returned to Buckinghamshire, along with first-team coach, Richard Thomas.

He added: "It's been a huge experience for me.

Returning home to manage

The 39-year-old, who played 557 times for the Adams Park club between 2003 and 2022, has replaced the outgoing Gareth Ainsworth who departed for Queens Park Rangers after more than 10 years in charge.

Bloomfield has been part of Ainsworth's coaching staff following his retirement from the game last year, and enjoyed a five-month spell with the Essex-team between September and February, winning nine of his 28 games.
